Resident Advisory Board & PHA Host A Public And Affordable Housing Congressional 3rd District Forum *Sen. Sharif Street wins in a straw poll of PHA Resident Leaders*

Philadelphia, PA -- Resident Advisory Board (RAB) and PHA proudly co-hosted a Public and Affordable Housing 3rd District Congressional Forum at PHA headquarters located in the heart of North Philadelphia. This was the first and only forum that focused on public and affordable housing. The candidates were able to engage directly with PHA resident leaders that represent more than 80,000 families residing in homes owned or financially supported by the PHA.

RAB President Asia Coney and PHA President & CEO Kelvin A Jeremiah served as the moderators. The six candidates sat at the PHA Board table from left to right facing the resident leaders beginning with Sen. Sharif Street, Dr. Ala Stanford, Jahmiel Jackson, Shaun Griffith, NaDerah Griffin and State Rep. Morgan Cephas. The forum was designed as an open dialogue, not a debate. The questions came directly from residents, and each candidate was given two minutes to respond to the same questions.

Opening the forum, Mr. Jeremiah alongside Ms. Coney set the stage with a powerful reminder of what is at stake. PHA is the 4th largest housing authority in the country and the largest provider, developer, and owner of affordable housing in Pennsylvania serving more than 35,000 households, through its Public Housing and Housing Choice Voucher programs.

"Everything that happens in

Washington, DC, impacts the Authority," said Jeremiah. "That is why this position is especially important to PHA and the residents." He noted that PHA operates on a \$500 million annual budget and receives zero funding from the State or City, making federal leadership critical to the future of public housing in Philadelphia.

Jeremiah also highlighted PHA's strong history of collaboration with Congressman Dwight Evans, under whose leadership PHA received six Choice Neighborhood Implementation Grants from HUD. Those grants, totaling \$111.5 million, resulted in more than 2,500 new units, leveraged over \$1 billion in public and private funds, and created more than 1,000 jobs.

Mr. Jeremiah also pointed to PHA's proven track record at the polls. In our last mayoral forum, PHA residents successfully predicted the winner.

Our resident leaders asked the questions that matter most to our daily lives, federal housing funding, tenant protections, maintenance and repairs, and the long-term future of public housing in Philadelphia.

Following the forum residents had a close door discussion on the

candidates. The resident leaders conducted a straw poll and Sen. Sharif Street won in a landslide, earning overwhelming support from PHA resident leaders. With 97% of the votes. State Rep Cephas received 3% but has since suspended her campaign.

Ms. Coney concluded the session by thanking the candidates, "Thank you for showing up today," said Coney during her closing remarks. "It is important that the citywide organization I represent, RAB, be recognized and that the city knows that we are here and we count. So, by showing up today, you are literally saying to my people, that we count."

The May 19th primary is quickly

Election Day FAQs

How do I get an early ballot?

Today, visit the County Board of Elections Office in City Hall, Room 140 once ballots are available.

Can Independents vote in this Primary?

Yes! Non-partisan voters citywide can vote on Ballot Questions.

Where do I vote?

Enter your address in the Polling Place Finder App found on the Philadelphia City Commissioners website at vote.phila.gov



Scan the QR code or call **215-685-1590**.

Do I have to show ID to vote?

Voters in Philadelphia are only required to show ID the first time they're voting in a new division. If this isn't your first time, no ID is required. If this is your first time, there are many options. Click here for the full list of acceptable forms of ID.

What kind of voting machine do we use in Philadelphia?

Philadelphia voters use the ExpressVote XL when they vote at the polls on the Election Day. The ExpressVote XL makes the voting process simple and reliable!

After inserting your paper ballot, you simply use your finger to select your language and candidates, touching the middle of the candidate's name. When you've made all your selections, press the Print Ballot button in the bottom-right-hand corner of the screen. Touch Print again on the pop-up message and your ballot will print. Review your choices in the window to confirm that your selections are all printed correctly, and then touch Vote.



What if my name's not in the book?

If your name isn't in the pollbook, or if you requested to Vote by Mail but never returned a ballot, you may need to vote by Provisional Ballot. A Provisional Ballot is used just like any Vote by Mail ballot – simply fill in the ovals next to your candidates, put the completed ballot in your secrecy envelope, and put that inside the Envelope with your Voter's Affirmation. Be sure to follow all instructions from the Election Board Workers when filling out your voter's affirmation on the outer envelopes.

What do I do if someone's trying to prevent me from voting? What if someone's telling me how to vote inside the Polling Place?

Voters can call the election hotline at **(215) 686-1590** or the Philadelphia District Attorney's office at **(215) 686-9641** for assistance on Election Day. Any voter whose name is not in the pollbook is entitled to receive a Provisional Ballot. Electioneering is not allowed inside the polling place, or within 10 feet of the entrance to the room where voting is occurring. Nobody is allowed to influence or intimidate you inside the polling place.

Ballot Questions

There will be 3 ballot questions for voters to consider for a yes/no vote on May 19, 2026. It's important to note that while only registered Democrats or Republicans can vote for candidates on the primary ballot, due to the Commonwealth's closed primary system, any registered voter can vote on the ballot questions.

Question One

Shall the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter be amended to provide for the creation of the Philadelphia Retirement Savings Board to oversee a defined contribution retirement program for the benefit of eligible private-sector workers, and to authorize City Council to determine the composition, powers and duties of the board?

Statement: The City's Home Rule Charter sets up the framework of City government. The Charter is the City's constitution.

A "yes" vote means you approve the creation of the Philadelphia Retirement Savings Board as an independent board within the City's government. The Board would oversee creation and administration of a retirement program for certain eligible workers whose employers do not offer them a retirement plan. Contributions to the plan would only come from the participating workers. Details of the retirement program may be established by ordinance.

Question Two

Shall the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter be amended to provide for the creation of the Office of the Youth Ombudsperson to improve the safety and quality of services for youth placed in juvenile justice, child welfare, and behavioral health residential care facilities, and to authorize City Council to determine additional powers and duties of the Youth Ombudsperson as needed to carry out this mission?

Statement: The City's Home Rule Charter sets up the framework of City government. It is the City's constitution.

The Office of the Youth Ombudsperson monitors the safety and quality of

services for youth in residential placements. It was created by the Mayor in 2022, but is not part of the formal City Charter framework and is not a permanent office.

If you vote "yes" on this ballot question, that means you approve including the Office of the Youth Ombudsperson in the City's Charter and making it permanent. It also means you approve allowing Council to give the office additional powers and duties by ordinance.

Question 3

Should the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter be revised to allow elected City officials to run for state or federal office without having to resign from their elected City position?

Statement: The Philadelphia Home Rule Charter is the City's constitution; it sets up the rules for City government.

The current City Charter generally requires that, if City officers and employees become candidates for public office, they must resign from their City position first. It also includes specific rules for elected City officers. They generally must follow the same rule, except when running for re-election.

If you vote "yes" on this ballot question, it means you want to change the rule as it applies to elected City officers besides the Mayor. They would be allowed to keep their City position when running for state or federal office, but would still have to resign from their City position to run for a new local office.
